



# LINDAU NOBEL LAUREATE MEETINGS

## Selection Criteria

### for the 76<sup>th</sup> Lindau Nobel Laureate Meeting (Physiology/Medicine)

The 76<sup>th</sup> Lindau Nobel Laureate Meeting will take place from 27 June to 2 July 2027. Nobel Laureates in Physiology/Medicine and approximately 600 highly talented Young Scientists will participate in a unique week dedicated to scientific exchange, inspiration, and networking through lectures, panel discussions, and small-group sessions.

Academic Partners of the Lindau Meetings are invited to nominate their **most outstanding Young Scientists** as candidates for participation. Participants will be selected through a multi-stage evaluation process based on the nominations and applications submitted in due time and proper form. The final decision rests solely with the Scientific Selection Committee of the meeting.

We welcome nominations/applications from undergraduate, master's and doctoral students, and early-career postdoctoral scientists in the field of Physiology/Medicine and closely related disciplines who meet the following criteria at the time of application:

#### *Formal criteria:*

- First time attendance at a Lindau Meeting,
- Fluency in English and willingness to actively participate in discussions with Nobel Laureates and fellow Young Scientists,
- Commitment to attend the full duration of the meeting in Lindau,
- Engagement in extracurricular activities,
- Submission of two detailed recommendation letters in English by academic advisors and/or internationally renowned scientists, who know the applicant well,
- Submission of the completed online application form before the deadline in November 2026.

#### *Career-specific criteria:*

- (1) Undergraduate students
  - Demonstration of exceptional interest and outstanding knowledge in their field of study, supported by two detailed letters of reference.
- (2) Master's and doctoral students
  - Evidence of excellent research performance, demonstrated, for example, by publications, conference presentations, grants, and academic awards.
- (3) Young postdoctoral scientists
  - At an early career stage (i.e. up to 5 years of postdoctoral experience), not yet holding an independent group leader position,
  - A strong publication record in high-ranking journals as first, last and/or corresponding author,
  - Presentation of their research at major international scientific conferences, preferably as an invited speaker.
